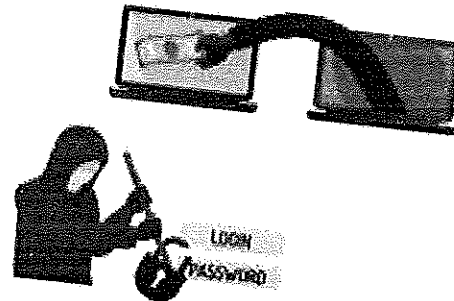


## Best practices to HALT HACKERS looking to exploit the pandemic

Cyber crooks want you to download their malware, and they'll try to trick you. A simple alert to IT could prevent big problems.

### Do not open emails that:

- Report news related to COVID-19
- Masquerade as an alert from the World Health Organization
- Purport to come from a friend or colleague but seem unusual
- Catch you off guard in any way



**And *never* open an attachment or click a link if the sender is unknown**

## Watch what you click

During the global spread of the coronavirus, thousands of new phishing and scam websites have popped up with coronavirus-related buzzwords.

### ***Adhere to telecommuting policies and procedures!***

Remote access to organizational resources creates its own unique risks. Ensure information sent, particularly information containing protected health information, is encrypted.

Among safe practices:

- Encrypt whenever possible
- Don't share work devices
- Don't download information to personal devices
- Stay off public wi-fi
- Report lost or stolen devices immediately
